

The President of the Australian Wildlife Society, Stephen Grabowski, was delighted to announce the opening of the Society's new National Office and Education Centre at 9/121 Queen Street, Campbelltown, New South Wales.

For the first time in over one hundred years, the Board of the Society decided to purchase and establish a new National Office and Education Centre to cope with the expanding work of the Society in wildlife conservation across Australia.

"After some 115 years, the Society now has a new permanent home from which to operate and promote wildlife conservation and environmental education programs across Australia", Stephen said.

The new National Office and Education Centre was officially opened on Tuesday, 20 August 2024, at 11 am by Gregory Charles Warren MP, Member for Campbelltown, with some thirty-eight guests in attendance, including councillors and representatives from Campbelltown City Council, life members and members of the Society, and friends and family, joined us to celebrate this special occasion.

Steve Wisbey OAM, the Master of Ceremonies, officially opened the event and invited Gregory Warren MP, to say a few words. Mr Warren first congratulated the Society on its achievements to date and wished the Society and its President well for a successful future.

He communicated his concern for the future of the koala population in Campbelltown and articulated that balancing the needs of wildlife with an expanding community can be complex. He said the roads are needed to ensure members of the community can get from A to B, but it is also crucial that wildlife is not put at risk at the same time. Mr Warren voiced his support for the work of the Society and is committed to collaborating with the Society in the future to ensure our wildlife conservation efforts are successful.

Steve Wisbey OAM invited the Chief Executive Officer, Patrick Medway AM, to say a few words. Patrick spoke about the history of the Society and its activities and our efforts to continue the legacy of our predecessors to ensure our native wildlife persists in the future. He said, "Since our establishment in 1909, we have advocated for legally protecting Australia's precious animals and plants. Throughout history, we have achieved significant milestones and victories for wildlife, such as ending the cruel practice of skinning koalas for their fur. We are committed to continuing this vital work and expanding our wildlife conservation efforts nationally".

The President of the Society, Stephen Grabowski, was then invited to say a few words on behalf of the Board. He acknowledged and thanked everyone for their attendance and expressed the Society's hopes for the future. He mentioned that we look forward to forming solid connections and collaborating with key stakeholders to ensure local wildlife conservation. Stephen also
